Special Collections also reserves the right to set limits on the amount of copying or scanning it will undertake. Fees are meant to offset the cost of staff time, materials, and handling. Once this form is received, staff will evaluate your request and send you an invoice. Acceptable forms of payment include check and cash. Please make checks out to the College of Charleston.

Researchers wishing to publish (internet and social media included), broadcast, perform, or exhibit materials held by Special Collections must request separate written permission.
